

BOOK CLUB COLLECTION

What is the Book Club Collection?

The Book Club Collection provides copies of books, usually with a study guide, to local book clubs and to book clubs sponsored by branches. Most sets have 12 copies. Sets check out on one library card for six weeks, with no renewals.

How can I request a Book Club Set?

Book Club sets can be requested by calling 531-6333, extension 2030, preferably during weekdays between 8:30 to 5:00, Fridays until 1:00.

Can I request any book title for a Book Club Set?

No. Only the titles on the list are available as book club sets.

Where can I find a list of books in the Book Club Collection?

From the ppld.org webpage, click on Library Services, then Book Discussion Groups and scroll down to the Book Club Collection link. Or from the ppld.org webpage, click on Catalog, then on the right side of the page under Select Collections, click on Book Club Collection.

What if I want to pick all of the books for the year from the Book Club Collection?

If your book club wants to choose titles for the entire year, it is recommended that you select 15-20 titles and be flexible about when you get them. About half of the over 200 sets are checked out at any time. They cannot be held more than two weeks before they are picked up.

How far in advance does a patron need to make a request?

You can request a title no more than about two weeks from the time you would like to pick it up. It takes 1 or 2 days to get to a branch other than Penrose.

Where can a patron pick up a Book Club Set?

Sets can be picked up at any branch and returned to any branch.

How many sets can a patron have checked out?

You may have more than one set checked out at a time. Ideally, you will hand out the new set at the same meeting you pick up the old set.

***The Accidental Tourist* – Anne Tyler**

Macon Leary is a travel writer who hates both travel and anything out of the ordinary. He is grounded by loneliness and an unwillingness to compromise his creature comforts when he meets Muriel, a deliciously peculiar dog-obedience trainer who up-ends Macon's insular world—and thrusts him headlong into a remarkable engagement with life. (Random House)

***The Age of Innocence* – Edith Wharton**

265 pages, also available in large print, cd, Playaway, guide in penguin.com

Edith Wharton's most famous novel, written immediately after the end of the First World War, is a brilliantly realized anatomy of New York society in the 1870s. The charming Newland Archer is content to live within its constraints until he meets Ellen Olenska, whose arrival threatens his impending marriage as well as his comfortable future. (Gardners)

***The Alchemist* – Paulo Coelho**

177 pages, also available in large print, eBook, guide in readinggroupguides.com

The charming tale of Santiago, a shepherd boy, who dreams of seeing the world, is compelling in its own right, but gains resonance through the many lessons Santiago learns during his adventures. He journeys from Spain to Morocco in search of worldly success, and eventually to Egypt, where a fateful encounter with an alchemist brings him at last to self-understanding and spiritual enlightenment. The story has the comic charm, dramatic tension and psychological intensity of a fairy tale, but it's full of specific wisdom as well, about becoming self-empowered, overcoming depression, and believing in dreams. ***Alias Grace* – Margaret Atwood**

A finalist for the Booker Prize, a national best-seller by the author of *The Handmaid's Tale* tells the story of an enigmatic Victorian woman accused of a double murder and the psychologist who treats her.

***The Amateur Marriage* – Anne Tyler**

Marrying quickly during World War II after falling in love at first sight, a mismatched couple discovers that their different personalities and approaches to life are taking a toll on their relationship and their family.

***Angry Housewives Eating Bonbons* – Lorna Landvik**

The Freesia Court Book Club, renamed "Angry Housewives Eating Bon-Bons" is the story of a group of women and their acceptance of one another just as they are, faults and all. Landvik has crafted a beautiful portrait of female friendship through the years.

***The Art of Racing in the Rain* – Garth Stein**

Nearing the end of his life, Enzo, a dog with a philosopher's soul, tries to bring together the family, pulled apart by a three year custody battle between daughter Zoe's maternal grandparents and her father Denny, a race car driver.

***Astrid & Veronika* – Linda Olsson**

259 pages, also available on cd, Playaway, guide in book

A lyrical study of friendship, love, and loss chronicles the evolving relationship between Veronika, a young New Zealand writer struggling with a recent tragedy and trying to finish her novel, and Astrid, an older, reclusive neighbor who offers comfort in the form of companionship and home-cooked meals, in a debut novel set against the backdrop of small-town Sweden.

***Atlas Shrugged* - Ayn Rand**

1168 pages, also available on cd, eAudio, guide in readinggroupguides.com

The book's female protagonist, Dagny Taggart, struggles to manage a transcontinental railroad amid the pressures and restrictions of massive bureaucracy. Her antagonistic reaction to a libertarian group seeking an end to government regulation is later echoed and modified in her encounter with a utopian community, Galt's Gulch, whose members regard self-determination rather than collective responsibility as the highest ideal. The novel contains the most complete presentation of Rand's personal philosophy, known as objectivism, in fictional form. (The Merriam-Webster Encyclopedia of Literature)

***Atonement* – Ian McEwan**

The Booker Prize-winning author of *Amsterdam* creates a richly textured novel, set in 1935 England that follows thirteen-year-old Briony Tallis, who witnesses an event involving her sister Cecilia and her childhood friend Robbie Turner, as she becomes the victim of her own imagination, which tears her family apart and leads her on a lifelong search of truth and absolution.

***Back When We Were Grownups* – Anne Tyler**

Beck Davitch looks back on her thirty-year marriage to Joe and her role as a mother and manager of the Open Arms, wondering if she is living the life she was meant to live and reconsidering her dedication to the family business.

***Balzac and the Little Chinese Seamstress* – Sijie Dai**

During the Chinese Cultural Revolution, two boys are sent to the country for reeducation, where their lives take an unexpected turn when they meet the beautiful daughter of a local tailor and stumble upon a forbidden stash of Western literature.

***Barefoot* – Elin Hilderbrand**

Visiting Nantucket with their children during a summer vacation, three women befriend a local youth and share their struggles with such challenges as infidelity, the loss of a job under scandalous circumstances, and health problems.

***The Bean Trees* – Barbara Kingsolver**

Taylor Greer leaves her poverty-stricken life in Kentucky and heads west, picking up an abandoned Native American baby girl whom she names Turtle and finds a new home in Tucson.

***Bee Season* – Myla Goldberg**

An ordinary girl with an exceptional gift for spelling, young Eliza Naumann embarks on the rough-and-tumble "spelling bee" circuit, where her quirky family will collide with the harsh realities of life.

After a decade of spending the delightful summer week at their country house in New Hampshire, the members of the extended Seton family are confronted by a terrible accident when a partially loaded hunting rifle in the wrong hands leads to tragedy, testing the values, convictions, and relationships that hold the family together.

Set in Virginia's Appalachian mountains, the novel follows Ave Maria Mulligan on her quest to discover just who she is and what she wants out of life. ***Child of a Rainless Year* – Jane Lindskold**

Middle-aged Mira Fenn knows she has an uncomfortably exotic past. As a small girl, she lived in an ornate old house in tiny Las Vegas, New Mexico, tended by oddly silent servant women and ruled by her coldly flamboyant mother Colette. When Mira was nine, Colette went on one of her unexplained trips, only this time she never returned. Placed with foster parents, Mira was raised in Ohio, normal save for her passion for color. On gaining adulthood, she learned that she still owned the New Mexico house. She also learned that, as a condition of being allowed to adopt her, Mira's foster parents had agreed to change their name, move to another state, and never ask

why. Years later, going through family papers after the deaths of her elderly foster parents, Mira finds documents that pique her curiosity about her vanished mother and the reasons behind her strange childhood and adoption.

Recently divorced and having no family of her own, Joy Candellaro is beginning to dream of a new life with widower Daniel O'Shea and his son, Bobby, until a fateful Christmas Eve forces her to make a painful choice.

***A Confederacy of Dunces* – John Kennedy Toole**

A fat New Orleans misanthrope who constantly rebukes society, Ignatius Reilly, gets a job at his mother's urging but ends up leading a workers' revolt.

***The Constant Princess* – Philippa Gregory**

A richly detailed fictional portrait of Henry VIII's first wife, Katherine of Aragon, the daughter of Queen Isabella and King Ferdinand of Spain, follows her from her passionate youthful marriage to Henry's older brother, Arthur, her widowhood, her marriage to Henry and her denial of her true love for Arthur, and the divorce that led to Henry's second marriage to Anne Boleyn.

***The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-time* – Mark Haddon**

***The Heart is a Lonely Hunter* – Carson McCullers**

With its profound sense of moral isolation and its compassionate glimpses into its characters' inner lives, the novel is considered McCullers' finest work. At its center is the deaf-mute John Singer, who becomes the confidant for all various types of misfits in a Georgia mill town during the 1930s. Each one yearns for escape from small town life. When Singer's mute companion goes insane, Singer moves into the Kelly house, where Mick Kelly, the book's heroine, finds solace in her music. Wonderfully attune to the spiritual isolation that underlies the human condition, and with a deft sense for racial tensions in the South, McCullers spins a haunting, unforgettable story that gives voice to the rejected, the forgotten, and the mistreated -- and, through Mick Kelly, gives voice to the quiet, intensely personal search for beauty. ***The History of Love* – Nicole Krauss**
